




BAND & CHOIF

























ROOTBEER FEST




WEDNESDAY NIGHT LIV






THE BRICK HOUSE















CRU CRAZIES


OLIVIA GRACE HICKS





She is a true patriot.

My grandpa went to Vietnam in 1967, leaving behind my grandma who was pregnant with their third child, my mom. My uncles, Davey and Stevie, were 10 and 7. My grandma kept the homefires burning while my grandpa served his country. In this way, she, too, served her country. My grandma was 32 at the time she said goodbye to my grandpa when he volunteered for a tour of duty in Vietnam as part of the U.S. Air Force. She said her two boys thought that they could get away with just about anything then. But my grandma told them, "Just because your dad left doesn't mean you don't have to listen to me!" And they did listen. My grandma had a support system in her family, church, and friends. These people who loved and assisted her while my grandpa was gone are also true patriots. Even though it was hard to understand why a fundamental piece of their family was missing, my uncles and mom were patriots for living without their father for a year.

My grandma is a patriot because she kept things running on the home-front and tried to support her family even though my grandpa wasn't there. She never thought about what it was like to do things by herself. She just did what needed to be done and didn't question it because she knew that was the way things had to be. She carried herself in a way that ultimately showed her as a strong individual, riding on the hope that her husband would return soon to be with his family. My grandpa was gone for 11 months. My mom was born June 8, 1968, and my grandpa did not get to see her, his only daughter, until February 1969.

My grandpa was also a true patriot. At the age of 18, he joined the United States Air Force not knowing what the long road ahead would look like. Throughout his service in the Air Force, he was stationed all over the United States as well as in Northern Canada. When talk of Vietnam surfaced and more volunteers were sought out, my grandpa was one of those men to stand up and take on the challenge. With two boys and a pregnant wife at home, this would not have been an easy decision for any man, but what it did mean was a pay raise and a way to better support his growing family. He worked in radar near Danang at Monkey Mountain in Vietnam during the day and at night drove officials to hot zones across enemy lines for extra pay. He is fortunate he came home safely, but the welcome was not as friendly as many had imagined it would be. Wearing a uniform and walking through the airport brought scowls, hateful comments, and even spit to the men coming home from Vietnam at that time. It was a time of confusion and misunderstanding in America, which unfortunately led to bad treatment of the men who not only fought overseas but gave their lives as well. Up until his death in 2006, he and my grandma dealt with the lasting effects of his being exposed to Agent Orange, a defoliant chemical used during the war, which probably contributed to his prostate cancer, diabetes, and high blood pressure. The effects war has on serving men are not small, and it's humbling to not only hear their stories but to help them as well.

As Veteran's Day has recently passed, we remember all our heroes and patriots, and we should continue to remember them throughout the year. Patriots come in all forms, in every work field, and from every state. Today's patriots are not only our servicemen and women, but the families who are left behind to support their children, run schools and business, and keep the United States strong by bonding together and completing the everyday tasks at hand.
