

# 75 Years — And An Old School Is Still Learning New Tricks

"You are a unique group with a unique assignment. Never before have students, faculty, and administration pledged themselves to so ambitious an assignment ..."

So began Bill Boggs, Student Council President, as he addressed the Community Living Council in its "historic" opening session three weeks ago.

And unique was the word. For the first time ever, Trevecca students

writing, re-writing, (and re-writing again!) proposed rules and guidelines.

Council members were divided into three main committees: 1) Dress and Behavior, 2) Dorm Life, and 3), Christian Community and Personal Growth. Each committee met separately to work on proposed guidelines concerning their respective areas, then submitted the proposals to a plenary session of all members for consideration and (hopefully) approval.

approval of the CLC concept. As one student put it, "Students usually think of 'Trustee' as being the word that immediately precedes the word 'No!' — but it's just not that way."

"... our search is also for maturity and growth; Christian growth! We should seek a deeper commitment to establish Christian lifestyles."

There was a keen awareness of the great responsibility that had been bestowed upon the Council — a responsibility which held opportunities for great accomplishments.

A sense of satisfaction and accomplishment was felt by all as the Council finally approved all three committee proposals. The first big step was over.

Next, the guidelines were sent to the Student Life Council. This council had the right to reject any guideline submitted by CLC which it deemed unacceptable. Such a rejection would then refer the specific guideline back to clc for further re-consideration.

However, that was not the case. Student Life returned the guidelines to CLC with the recommendation of only a few minor changes in wording alone. The spirit of the papers were kept completely.

were given the opportunity of writing their own rules and guidelines for the coming school year. In the past, rules and guidelines have been formulated by the administration and "dropped" on the students with little or no discussion. But not this time.

It all started last May when Bill Boggs, President of Stuco, and Dean Jerry Hull co-sponsored a resolution to the Administration Council, recommending the formulation of a Community Living Council — the purpose of which would be to legislate rules, regulations and guidelines for student behavior.

Much preparation was made during the summer, and at last the whole council met together for the first time on Friday, Sept. 5th. But the hard work had only just begun.

The next three days were spent almost entirely in Council meetings

Council members represented all facets of Trevecca's community, therefore opinions were varied and discussions were lengthy before even the slightest detail was voted on and passed. However, in spite of the long, tiring hours and mental exhaustion, there was a constant spirit of unity and Christian cooperation among all persons involved.

Communication between students, faculty, and administrators was seemingly open, honest, and unreserved. Even some members of the Board of Trustees got in on the action at the very first meeting, and expressed their wholehearted

As rules were discussed, time and time again the words "trust" and "freedom" were mentioned. The Council sought to find rules that would uphold Christian values and yet promote faith in students' separate lifestyles and personal discretion.

One concern of council members was that there would be a minority of students on campus who would abuse such freedom. Yet the Council quickly agreed that those few individuals would always exist, while the majority of students at Trevecca were mature enough to accept the responsibility.

Plans were made for the CLC to meet within the first two weeks of every quarter to review the guidelines, discuss their effectiveness, and consider any changes. Then the Council voted unanimously to accept the final document, and everyone broke into a round of spontaneous applause. The work was finished.

## Change Of Plans In New World Ministries Building

At the Board of Trustees meeting of September 5-6, Rev. Ed Nash stated that due to financial increases in the costs of construction, the original plans for the World Ministries Building are no longer feasible. The plan, which was put into action last year concerned a joint effort between College Hill and TNC in which the college would trade four lots on Lester Avenue to the church for the use of their new World Ministries Building for chapel and classroom facilities.

Rev. Nash then presented to the board an alternate course of action, suggesting that the school could lease the present College Hill sanctuary. The proposal was turned down because of insufficient funds.

However, Reverend Nash and Dr. Moore are still confident that, although the completion date of the building may be set back, there will definitely be a new chapel for Treveccans to enjoy and share

with the church — not under the same plans, but with the same objectives. Rev. Nash, Dr. Moore, and all others concerned, are still discussing many possibilities. Everyone seems quite hopeful.

In the meantime, a 5.8 million dollar financial campaign was approved by the Board of Trustees, and the money has already started coming in. The plans would cover a 5-year time span, and include:

- 1) enlarging and refurbishing Bud Robinson Hall for a college center
- 2) remodeling McClurkan Hall

for an auditorium and classroom building

3) refurbishing McKay Hall for a guest house an overflow dormitory.

Other improvements on various college buildings are anticipated from these funds.

At this writing, the actual facts are quite vague, and the issue of the new chapel-church building is still being discussed and all possibilities explored. But, whatever the case, it is certain that Trevecca is in store for some much-needed improvements.

## TNC Personnel Honored

At the President's Dinner on September 5th, Dr. Mark R. Moore, TNC President, presented the Teacher of the Year Award to Professor Gary Coulter and the Staff Member of the Year Award to Robert Gore, Chief of Security.

Coulter came to Trevecca in 1972 to teach in the Department of Communication and Speech. He has directed the Campus radio station, WNAZ, and served as Assistant Baseball Coach. Three years ago Coulter entered Forensic competition with only four students in his program. This year he has 50 students enrolled and will have a traveling squad of 22. In 1974-75 two of his students, Carl Hall and Chuck Green, finished first and second, respectively, in the State of Tennessee and Hall placed second in the nation.

Robert Gore has been Security Chief for two years. He was formerly Plant Director until an accident forced him to shift responsibilities. Gore runs a tight ship which makes it possible for the president and his administrators to sleep comfortably at night. His daily reports to the Dean of Student Services, Jerry Hull, are classics. Not only does he report the happenings on campus in great detail, but he adds editorial comments that bring chuckles to the reader. Criticism depresses him because it confirms his own secretly shaky opinion of himself. Snubs hurt him, and the merest suspicion of unpopularity in any quarter rouses him to bitterness.

A serenity of spirit cannot be achieved until we become the master of our own actions and attitudes. To let another determine whether we shall be rude or gracious, elated or depressed, is to relinquish control over our own personality — which is ultimately all we possess. The implications are endless. But one stands out because of my initial concern. We must have the same mind of the One who sat among sinners, accepted people the way they were, brought UNITY to a group of diverse individuals without making them carbon copies of Himself, and taught that there is one supreme commandment of loving one another. The same One who commanded us to carry the truths to everyone without thought of their color, creed, social standing, moral values, or their "spirituality." Rather, we are to minister to and love each person as we are loved by Christ.

Let's become aware of our neighbor. Let's REACH OUT AND TOUCH! Let's not become so ingrown that we forget those around us. "Finally, all of you, have UNITY of spirit, sympathy, love of the brethren, a tender heart, and a humble mind." (1 Peter 3:8).

Three new student-centered programs are being initiated at Trevecca Nazarene College this year — Community Living Guidelines, Campus Community Cells, and the Freshman Studies Program.

Twenty-two student leaders plus Harper L. Cole, Executive Vice President, Profes Gary Coulter, and E. Ray Thrasher, Assistant Librarian (representatives appointed by President Moore from the administration and faculty), make up the Community Living Council. They spent in excess of 600 man-hours formulating guidelines for campus living for 1975-76. This was an exhausting but highly educational experience. At least 25 students (including the 3 on the Student Life Council which reviews the work of the C.L.C.) have first-hand knowledge of the traumatic experience of developing guide-

lines. As a result of this approach the students feel that they actually "own" their regulations and that rules are not imposed on them by others. Each guideline had to be in harmony with the BIBLE and the MANUAL OF THE CHURCH OF THE NAZARENE and the purposes of the College. Enforcement of the guidelines will come primarily through peer pressure, although adequate disciplinary procedures were included.

The Dean of Student Service, Jerry Hull, is extremely interested in developing a spirit of "belonging" in the TNC community. He asked for volunteers from the faculty, staff, and administration to serve as Campus Community Cell sponsors. The entire student body, except freshmen, will be divided into groups of 12 to 15 students. Each group will have a student leader in addition to the sponsor. The Cells will meet periodically for fellowship and sharing. The basic philosophy of this program is centered in "caring." At least once during the year the Cell will be invited to the home of the sponsor.

A special program in Freshman Studies is in progress under the direction of Phyllis Flannery, Assistant Dean of the College. In order for the new students to have guidance in campus procedures and planning for life each is assigned to a special faculty sponsor. Together they will explore such subjects as: How to Study, Goal Setting, Career Opportunities, and Solving Problems in College Living. Hopefully no freshman will feel that nobody cares or that he is alone in the cold, cold, world. At various points during the Fall Term he and his advisor will conduct a Freshman Experience Evaluation. Beginning with the Winter Quarter the freshmen will join the Campus Community Cells.
